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This is the fifth annual activity report of the Trivedi Centre for Political Data (TCPD from here on), for the year 2019-20. It contains a description of the activities conducted by the Centre and its members this past year, elements of information regarding the Centre's structure and development as well as a description of the Centre's priorities and plans for the coming year.

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REPORT SUMMARY

This is the fifth annual activity report of the Trivedi Centre for Political Data (TCPD from here on), for the year 2019-20. It contains a description of the activities conducted by the Centre and its members this past year, elements of information regarding the Centre's structure and development as well as a description of the Centre's priorities and plans for the coming year.

The Centre's activities this year were concentrated on consolidating existing data efforts, conducting the Centre's first survey on women's political ambition in Haryana Panchayats, and turning previous work into publishable material. The Centre has now published 13 peer-reviewed publications, boosted by a special issue of the journal *Contemporary South Asia*, co-edited by Gilles Verniers and Christophe Jaffrelot. And our paper on LokDhaba was accepted and presented at ACM Compass, which is a reputed Computer Science conference.

The Centre covered four state elections this year (Haryana, Maharashtra, Jharkhand and Delhi), collecting data on main parties' candidates.

The Centre hosted four conferences and workshops, and conducted the second annual computational social science workshop in December 2019. Researchers from the Centre participated in 20 external engagements, including six CPR-TCPD Dialogues, hosted five workshops, and have been holding a weekly online seminar since the Centre went into lockdown. Seven undergraduate and MLS theses were supervised by TCPD faculty.

The Centre held its third Summer School in July 2019 as well as its second Summer Internship Program. About 60 participants took part in the Centre's summer course and 16 students from Ashoka and beyond interned with the Centre this past summer. 23 students worked with the Centre through a semester or through the year.

Several of our collaborators have been admitted into prestigious postgraduate and PhD programmes.

Two new courses offered to Political Science students have emerged from the Centre this year: Seeing like a Challenger and Empirical Studies of State Violence, both taught by Priyamvada Trivedi. The quantitative method courses' stream taught by Neelanjan Sircar relied extensively on TCPD data for exercises and assignments.

The Centre's work pace was partially disrupted by the lockdown this March. The Centre immediately shifted to working remotely and will continue to do so as long as the university remains shut. For the coming year, we look forward to converting most existing projects into publication submissions and data release, as our expansion plan has been put on hold temporarily. We also plan to prepare the ground for an expansion of the Centre's scope into new domains, including empirical research on the judiciary.

Several collaborators have secured admissions in various graduate programmes and one TCPD team member has made a presentation at a reputed conference:

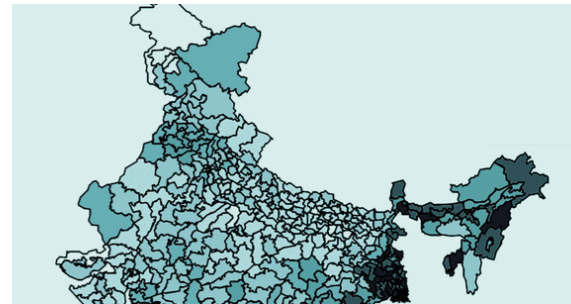
- Emily Russell has been admitted to the PhD programme in Political Science at Stanford and is a recipient of the Knight-Hennessy Fellowship.

SCIENTIFIC ACTIVITIES

01 DATA RELEASE AND NEW DATA

1.1. INDIAN COUNCIL OF MINISTERS

The TCPD-ICoM: Indian Council of Ministers Dataset contains information on the Indian Council of Ministers between 1990 and 2019. The data has been carefully extracted and verified from the official website of the Cabinet Secretariat and a publication of the Lok Sabha secretariat titled “केंद्रीय मंत्रिपरिषद (1947 - 2011)” which documents the names and portfolios allotted to ministers in this time period. We table it in an orderly manner, to systematically place the information under variables such as name of the candidates, election year, party name, gender, portfolio, rank, start date of appointment, end date of appointment, and constituency. Moreover, it has also incorporated various cabinet shuffles between the terms. The data also mentions the sources of information for each instance captured, so that users can verify the same. 02 LOKDHABA - NEW FEATURES

LokDhaba is TCPD's pioneering data collation tool that brings credible political data from India into the public domain.

LokDhaba has been upgraded from a Shiny application to a Reach-based application. A database is used to store data instead of CSV files; the data is then fetched through an API and rendered through a Javascript-based React application. This makes LokDhaba scalable and robust. A React-based framework is used for fast rendering of visualizations with client-side filtering. A search feature has been enabled in LokDhaba. New visualizations which show change over time in variables, such as voter turnout and winning parties, have been added. An API will soon be made public for easy data accessibility.

03 RECURRENT PROJECTS

3.1. MAPPING STATE ELECTIONS

The Centre covered four state elections this year (Haryana, Maharashtra, Jharkhand and Delhi). Fieldwork was conducted in these four states and the first phase of data collection on major parties' candidates' caste, religion, occupation, education and individual political career trajectory is complete.

CHART 1 6 Sikh, 3 Muslim MLAs elected

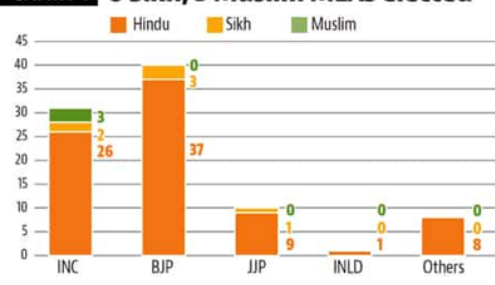


CHART 2 Women members down by four

CHART 4 55% first-time MLAs

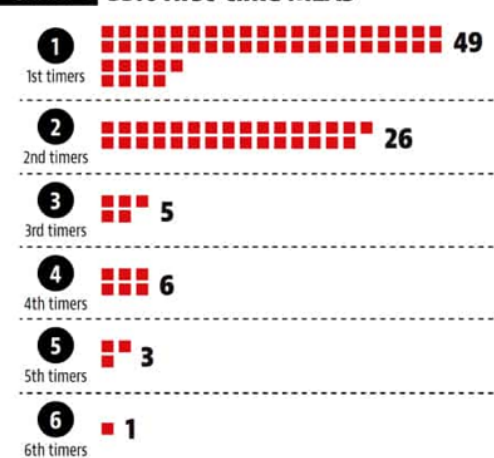


CHART 5 Education wise, no major change

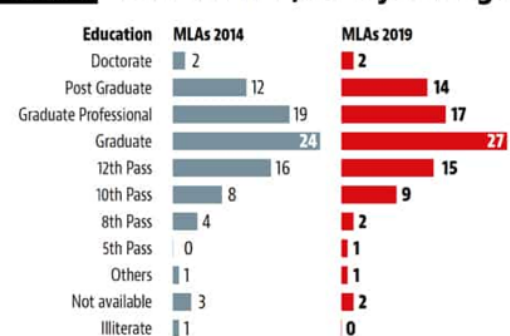
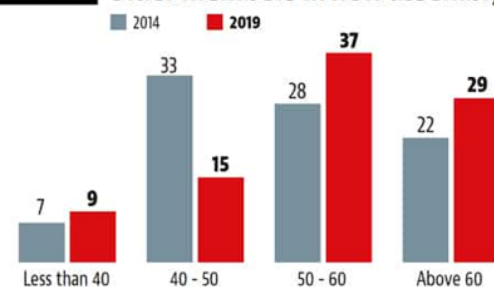


CHART 6 Older members in new assembly

3.2. INCUMBENCY MAPPING

Much of the year has been spent improving SURF and re-running the software on existing data. The incumbency mapping process involves assigning unique IDs to individual political actors who have contested any Vidhan Sabha or Lok Sabha election in India since 1962 across states and years. For this, we rely on our entity resolution tool - SURF and secondary research. During the past year, the process was carried out for states including - Bihar, Delhi, Haryana, Jharkhand, and Maharashtra. Currently, the process is being implemented on data from West Bengal, Kerala and Tamil Nadu. For all these states, the candidates were mapped such that those who contested state elections can also be identified in national elections and vice versa. Basim-U-Nissa and Mohit Kumar are leading this effort.

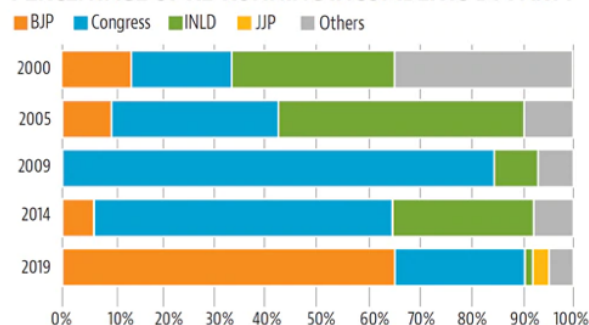

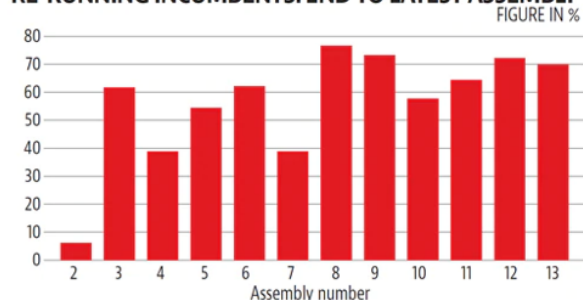
INCUMBENCY FACTOR

PERCENTAGE OF RE-RUNNING INCUMBENTS BY PARTY

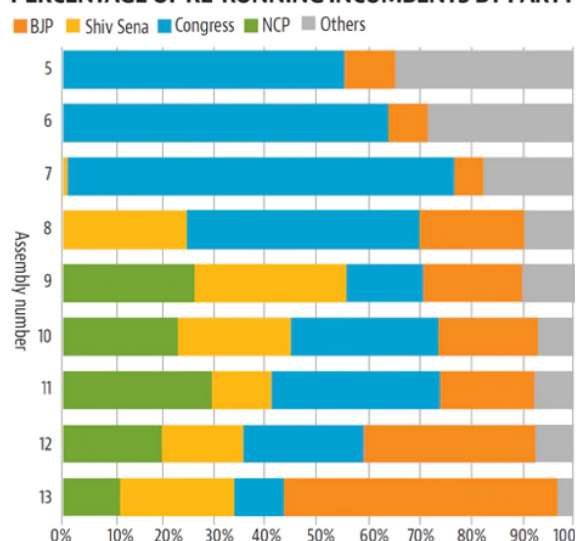


RE-RUNNING INCUMBENTS: 2ND TO LATEST ASSEMBLY

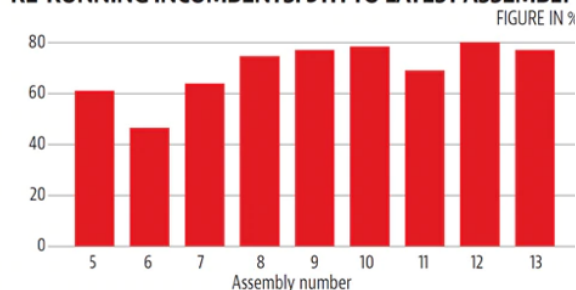


MAHARASHTRA

3.3. WOMEN IN POLITICS

The Centre ran its first survey of 1,100 sarpanches across 22 districts of Haryana. The objective of the survey is to measure possible gendered variations in political ambitions of men and women serving in local elective bodies. Thanks to the supervision of Sampurna Khasnabis, and the steering by Susan Osterman and Julia Kowalski (University of Notre Dame), the survey was successfully completed within four months with an excellent response rate. The survey was conducted in a total of 1100 villages across 22 districts in Haryana. 649 male sarpanches and 447 female sarpanches responded to the survey. The response rates are 100% and 96% for male and female sarpanches respectively. Susan Osterman and Gilles Verniers will be analysing the data over the summer and the Fall of 2020.

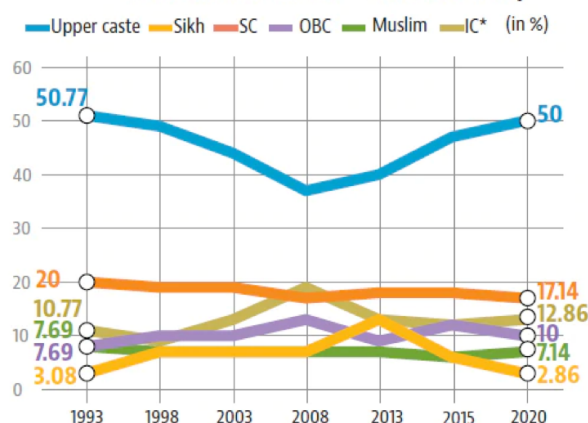

3.6. CODING CONTENTION

This is the second year of collaboration between the Peace Research Institute Oslo and TCPD on extracting information on different forms of contention from one national and two local dailies. The data from the project will be presented in the ECSSI conference in December 2020. This project is led by Priyamvada Trivedi. Basim-U-Nissa works as a researcher on this initiative.

04 NEW PROJECTS

4.1. WEB APPLICATION FOR PARLIAMENTARY QUESTIONS

While big data has tremendous applications for both research and policy recommendations, large datasets for text analysis have been almost non-existent in the Indian context. This application releases a cleaned and harmonized dataset of over 300,000 parliamentary questions that were raised in the Lok Sabha between 1999 and 2019. The application helps researchers and journalists obtain easy access to a variety of data in the public domain. With a full text search and options to easily view, subset and download the parliamentary questions, the tool will also be useful for researchers, policy practitioners and activists. This project is led by Saloni Bhogale.

4.2. RESEARCH PAPERS ON THE INDIAN PARLIAMENT

Three studies were conducted over the last year in the Indian Parliament. The first attempts to understand how diversity affects the content of discussion in the Parliament - specifically whether women MPs are able to more effectively represent women's issues in the Parliament than male MPs. This is using NLP and machine learning algorithms. This paper was selected to be presented at the Text as Data Conference hosted by the Berkeley Institute for Data Science. A working paper was also presented at Sciences Po during the Women in Indian Politics conference.

The second study is to understand the phenomenon of parliamentary disruptions in India - specifically what may be the factors that affect disruption. We attempt to empirically examine this over a period of 28 years, noting factors like divergence in policy preferences, electoral context and other institutional influences.

Such disruptions have important implications for the productivity of legislatures, and the findings bring to light the strategic intent that underlies the disruptive behavior in the legislature. The paper was presented at the Indian Statistical Institute's Annual Conference on Economic Growth and Development.

The third study aims to explain how term lengths affect the behavior of MPs, and whether a shorter term affects the type and quality of interventions in the Parliament. This is done by conducting a natural experiment using a unique dataset of the first term of the Rajya Sabha (1952 to 1958) - where MPs were randomly assigned 2-year, 4-year and 6-year terms. The study would be useful for future policy recommendations that involve setting tenures of actors in the government. This is a work in progress. Each of these studies is being led by Saloni Bhogale.

4.3. EXPANDING THE INDIAN COUNCIL OF MINISTERS DATASET

This dataset contains information on the Indian Council of Ministers between 1947 and 2019. Currently, data from 1990 and 2019 is available on our website. The project involved the digitization and verification of data from multiple sources, like the official website of the Cabinet Secretariat and publications by the Lok Sabha Secretariat. Such a public dataset will serve to be a reliable resource for journalists and researchers (akin to the election data released on LokDhaba) to perform studies and write pieces. This project is led by Saloni Bhogale.

4.4. BUILDING AND RELEASE OF DATA ON MEMBERS OF THE RAJYA SABHA

This dataset contains information on the Members of the Rajya Sabha between 1952 and 2020. The project involved the digitization and verification of data from sources like the official website of the Rajya Sabha and publications by the Secretariat in order to standardise the tenure of each MP, along with other attributes like reason for resignation, party affiliation, state of election etc. This project is led by Saloni Bhogale.

05 RESEARCH FUNDING

5.1.

TCPD is continuing its partnership with the Peace Research Institute Oslo (PRIO). This partnership emerged from the Empirical and Computational Social Sciences in India (ECSSI) conference that TCPD organized in December 2018. We have received a funding commitment of \$15,000 from PRIO to work on building an event dataset using national and local newspaper archives. This is a part of the Costs of Contention project led by Christian Davenport (University of Michigan) and Håvard Mokleiv Nygård (PRIO).

5.2.

TCPD has joined a group of scholars from Sciences Po, Columbia and Princeton to conduct a multi-year research project on minorities in India. This project will officially start in January 2021.

TEACHING

Two new courses have been developed by the Centre this year and been offered to Political Science students, in addition to five other recurrent courses taught in the Political Science department. Each course used datasets and methods built and used by the Centre, which functioned as a resource centre for students. TCPD staff were involved as teaching assistants or as technical support. Here is a list of courses taught:

01 SEEING LIKE A CHALLENGER

Inspired by Jim Scott's "Seeing Like a State", this course taught by Priyamvada Trivedi is a study of those who challenge the authority of governments. Students look at several forms of collective action ranging from everyday resistance to unpacking social movements and insurgencies. They read and closely examine the strengths and weaknesses of diverse methodologies in probing different dimensions of challenger behavior. Readings are drawn from Political Science, Sociology, and Anthropology. More specifically, the course covers the following dimensions of challenger behavior: their perception of the State and their grievances. How are grievances framed and mobilized? What kinds of resources are required to sustain mobilization? How are the resources generated? How do organizations recruit members? How do they deal with the "free-rider" problem? What tactics do they choose? Who do they target and why? How are the logistics of organization and coordination of collective action managed? How do challengers deal with repression and backlash? Last, but not the least important, how do challengers evaluate their own efficacy? Cases are drawn from Argentina, El Salvador, India, Northern Ireland, South Africa, the United States and Vietnam among others.

02 PARTY AND ELECTORAL POLITICS

This course taught by Gilles Verniers covers the trajectory of various families of political parties in India. The course took place concomitantly with the Delhi elections. Students conducted fieldwork, profiled small parties' candidates and attended major parties' rallies during the campaign. TCPD data was used to analyse the election results in real time.

03 QUALITATIVE RESEARCH METHODS 1

The goal of this course, taught by Neelanjan Sircar, is to introduce Political Science students to the basics of statistical analysis of data. Topics covered include descriptive statistics, hypothesis testing and study design, based on exercises largely designed and derived from TCPD data.

04 QUALITATIVE RESEARCH METHODS 2

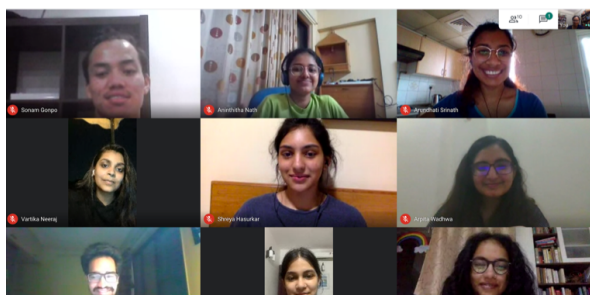
This is the second part of a two-course sequence in quantitative methods in Political Science, taught by Neelanjan Sircar. This course covers regression methods, including ordinary least squares, binary logistic, probit, and Poisson techniques. It provides a brief introduction to classification approaches and data mining, based on exercises largely designed and derived from TCPD data.

05 POLITICAL ECONOMY

The goal of this course, taught by Neelanjan Sircar, is to introduce students to the study of political economy. There is no well-established core discipline of political economy. In various ways, anthropologists, sociologists, political scientists and economists all claim to do work in political economy with different methods and texts. For the purposes of this course, political economy will refer to an approach to social science that assumes actors are strategic (and kinda sorta rational) in their interactions. It will also make use of modern tools of statistical analysis.

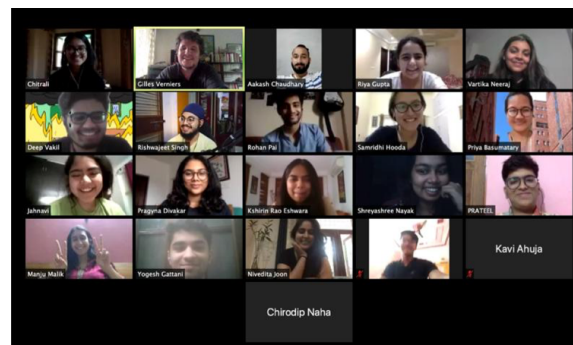
06 EMPIRICAL STUDIES OF POLITICAL VIOLENCE

This class focused on understanding variation in political violence. The main focus was on the role of the State. Non-State actors were also considered. The readings covered a diversity of methodological approaches - quantitative and qualitative research works, journalistic accounts, reports by NGOs and think tanks to name a few. Students spent a significant amount of time every class going through the evidence that is used by scholars to test their arguments. They examined the research design and worked through the replication data. They were encouraged to think through measurement, operationalization, and how data is generated to test hypotheses.

07 MAKING SENSE OF INDIAN ELECTIONS (YIF)



This is a recurrent six-week course taught by Gilles Verniers in the Young India Fellowship. The course consists of an introduction to Indian electoral politics combined with an introduction to political data handling, including mapping of state elections, political cartography and field data collection. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, no fieldwork assignment could be conducted.

PARTNERSHIPS

Two new courses have been developed by the Centre this year and been offered to Political Science students, in addition to five other recurrent courses taught in the Political Science department. Each course used datasets and methods built and used by the Centre, which functioned as a resource centre for students. TCPD staff were involved as teaching assistants or as technical support. Here is a list of courses taught:

EXISTING PARTNERSHIPS

HINDUSTAN TIMES

The Centre has published 12 articles in the Hindustan Times, as part of our partnership.

CENTRE FOR POLICY RESEARCH (CPR)

The Centre held eight seminars as part of the CPR-TCPD Dialogue on Indian Politics (see events section). Gilles Verniers has been appointed Senior Visiting Fellow at the Centre for Policy Research, Delhi. This appointment will help strengthen the existing partnership between TCPD and CPR, notably through the Dialogues on Indian Politics, whose scope has been expanded beyond electoral analysis.

SCIENCES PO

The LIA SPINPER project entered its third year. We organized one meeting in November 2020. The one scheduled for May 2020 has been postponed to the next academic year.

FACEBOOK

The Centre has completed its first survey - Haryana Sarpanch Survey. The pilot study was led by Susan Osterman (University of Notre Dame) and executed by Ashoka students. Julia Kowalski (University of Notre Dame) conducted qualitative fieldwork as a complement to the survey. Sampurna Khasnabis, project coordinator, coordinated the implementation and completion of the survey.



The pilot for the Haryana Sarpanch Survey was led by Susan Ostermann (University of Notre Dame) and conducted by Ashoka students in July 2020.

PEACE RESEARCH INSTITUTE OSLO (PRIO)

The project is in its second year. It will culminate in the 3rd Annual Conference on Empirical and Computational Social Sciences in India (ECSSI), which will be held in December 2020.

NEW PARTNERSHIPS

CHIEF MINISTER'S GOOD GOVERNANCE ASSOCIATES (CMGGA) PROGRAM

TCPD is collaborating with the Chief Minister's Good Governance Associates (CMGGA) program in an effort to formalize the experiences of the CMGGA associates into a research study. Through this program, three TCPD team members - Arushi Sharan, Ishika Sharan and Sampurna Khasnabis - are working with teams of CMGGA associates (~3 per team) to produce a research paper or a short brief, which will be made public by the end of their fellowship.

Arushi Sharan is guiding research on the following three topics related to the state government's Saksham Haryana initiative. Through this initiative, the state government is attempting to provide quality education to public schools:

- Online Transfer Policy for teachers in public schools in Haryana: This research project attempts to understand how the policy has affected work satisfaction for teachers in government schools across Haryana.
- Best Practices' in the implementation of Saksham Haryana: This qualitative research project aims to (a) identify the 'best practices' involved in the implementation of Haryana's grade-level competency program. (b) Understand the role that these practices play in the implementation of the program on ground from the perspective of all relevant stakeholders.
- Implementation of the Saksham Haryana program: This qualitative research project seeks to understand the administrative and coordination challenges faced by individual implementers, particularly mid-level implementers in the implementation of the Saksham (A grade-level competency program). It also seeks to understand their perception of the implementation.

Ishika Sharan is guiding work on the following two projects on the Beti Bachao Beti Padhao effort whose goal is to improve the sex ratio in Haryana through multiple initiatives:

- Communication strategies employed by Beti Bachao Beti Padhao scheme: The paper explores the communication methods used by the Government of Haryana in attempting to achieve the ambitious goals of the Beti Bachao Beti Padhao scheme with respect to inducing a change in the mindset of its population.
- Implementation of the Beti Bachao Beti Padhao scheme: The paper explores the implementation of the Beti Bachao Beti Padhao scheme in Haryana. The paper studies the link between the policy as intended and the scheme initiatives as practiced on ground.

And lastly, Sampurna Khasnabis is guiding research on Antyodaya SARAL which is the Haryana state government's online public service delivery platform. The platform aims to simplify the process of applying for public services and schemes, through a single digital platform.

- The first team is studying the timeline of the conception of Antyodaya SARAL and its evolution over the past three years. They are examining the process of how different departments with diverse internal processes, hierarchies and incentives were brought together to function cohesively with each other on the platform.
- The second team is studying the performance indicators, designed by the Digital Haryana Cell (a wing of the state govt) which measure each department's performance on the platform as well as produce a cumulative score to capture each district's performance.
- And the last team is looking at the citizens' perspective of the public service delivery system in Haryana and how they use the platform.

INDRAPRASTHA INSTITUTE OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (IIIT) DELHI

TCPD is collaborating with Indraprastha Institute of Information Technology (IIIT) Delhi on a joint research program - Civic Data Lab Fellowship. The Fellowship aims to support short-term, innovative research projects to be undertaken by Computer Science and Social Science students who can combine their skill sets and explore new forms of data, or restructure already existing political science and civic datasets in ways that make them open and accessible to the public.

The first two projects undertaken under the Civic Data Lab Fellowship are:

- **PolNet: Challenges to network access during political events:** The fellow work on building a dataset of internet slowdowns from various technical databases and then combine it with electoral and other political data from TCPD. The resulting dataset will be used to assess whether there are relationships between electoral cycles/political events and internet access. Tushar (IIIT D) will be working with Dr. Sambuddho Chakravarty and Dr. Aasim Khan from IIIT-Delhi and Dr. Priyamvada Trivedi from TCPD.

- **SURF: Entity Matching and Resolution System for Indian Names:** SURF is an entity resolution tool built by TCPD for Indian names. The tool is designed to resolve names of candidates in order to create a unique identifier for each candidate who has ever contested an election. The project requires the fellow to understand the current Surf codebase, which is on Git (<https://github.com/tcpd/surf>). The fellow will work on improving the current algorithm by implementing string distance metrics like cosine and soundex and improving the current Surf UI. Aditya Garg (IIIT D) will be working with Dr. V. Raghava Mutharaju from IIIT-Delhi and Mohit Kumar from TCPD.
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EVENTS

The centre organized four conferences, three guest lectures and eight seminars with CPR this year, in addition to participating in a number of academic events.

CONFERENCES ORGANISED BY TCPD

MELBOURNE EVENT (AUGUST 20, 2019)

TCPD in collaboration with the University of Melbourne's School of Government and the Australia India Institute organized a forum on the The Future of Electoral Democracy in India and Australia on August 20 at the India Habitat Centre. The forum brought together leading electoral practitioners and thinkers from Australia and India for a day of practical knowledge exchange on how each country organizes and regulates elections and what lessons each can learn from the other.

We wish to note the outcomes of such an initiative. The intended outcome is that the interns work with the TCPD team to accomplish the project goals that have been set. There is an unintended outcome. By closely working with individual TCPD team members and amongst themselves, we build long-term relationships. These relationships become invaluable sources of mentorship, guidance, peer encouragement and feedback on work beyond the internship. We have observed the value of these relationships in two instances. The first was the release of the TCPD-ICoM dataset where SaloniBhogale worked with two UG Ashoka students - Aritro Bose and Dipanita Malik. And the second is the 2nd Annual ECSSI Conference which was driven by students sharing their work and receiving feedback. We value both the outcomes and will strive to maintain the high quality of our summer internship program.

NEXT STEPS

OBJECTIVES FOR JULY 2021 - JUNE 2022

It seems likely that the Covid pandemic will continue to disrupt the work at the Centre. There is no clarity, at this stage, whether fieldwork will be possible, notably during the Bihar elections in October. The Center will continue to function in remote mode through the summer and will resume work on campus once it formally reopens. The expansion plan discussed through the year is also likely to be postponed by a year.

Nonetheless, we regard the current situation as an opportunity to complete a number of ongoing projects, such as the revamping of Lok Dhaba and the release of legislators data, as well as to convert most of the work done over the past years into publications. Each researcher will define and adhere to a calendar of academic production, which should lead to increasing the number of publications by our members. Similarly, we aim to complete the overhaul of LokDhaba and the integration of legislators' data into the platform.

We enter the third and final year of the LIA-SPINPER project. We will concentrate on completing the deliverables of this project and work on an extension of the partnership with Sciences Po.

For this year, the Centre's priorities are thus the following:

- Increase external research funding by applying for grants and seeking funding through partnerships.
- Prepare the ground for an ambitious research program on the Indian judiciary
- Prepare the ground for an ambitious collaborative research program on the status of India's minorities
- Find new ways to organize data collection for state elections, notably through building local contacts and conducting phone or video interviews.

We envisage holding the Ashoka summer school in the winter this year, if at all possible.
